

STARK RECORDING FAMILY MILITARY HISTORY

PUTNAM COUNTY -- For years, **Betty Stark** has been painstakingly collecting and recording her family's history.



A collection of family photos, family trees, newspaper clippings and birth, marriage and death notices have been collected to be treasured by future generations.

But with the opening of the Putnam County Veterans Hall, Stark found another way to preserve some of her family's history and honor the veterans of her family for years to come.

"Until we sat down and started doing this, I didn't really realize just how many veterans are in my family," Stark told the Herald-Citizen.

Stark has placed her father, three of her nine children and two grandchildren in the Veterans Hall.

The history begins with **Herman Presley Stewart, Stark's father**. Stewart joined the U.S. Army May 29, 1919, and was discharged June 2, 1922. He served with the 10th Coast Artillery Corps. in World War I, achieving the rank of Private First Class.

Stewart was born Feb. 1, 1901, in Baxter, the son of Samuel P. and Pearl Holman Stewart. He had seven brothers and four sisters.

In addition to Stark, Stewart had four other children, Lela Ruth Gentry, Lulu Mae Stout, Kenneth "Jack" Stewart and Floyd "Tod."

He died Jan. 23, 1974.

Stark had nine children: Donna, June, Deborah, Gary, Connie, Robert, Judy, Betty "Cricket" and David.

Stark's son Gary Lynn Nabors joined the U.S. Army National Guard in 1976, serving until 1981. He achieved the rank of E6. Gary was born May 28, 1955 in Detroit, Mich.

Daughter Connie Mae Nabors-Stokley joined the U.S. Navy in 1976, serving until 1980. She served in San Diego, Calif., achieving the rank of PNZ. She was born Aug. 12, 1957 in Cookeville.

Robert Duane Nabors joined the U.S. Navy July 27, 1979. He achieved a rank of E3 and served at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremerton, Wash. He was discharged July 27, 1982.

"They mostly joined to get an education after they graduated from high school," said Stark. "I never really questioned why they were joining at the time. I thought it was just something they wanted to do."

Stark has three grandsons currently serving in the U.S. military.

Sgt. Jonathan Eric Plassman, with the U.S. Marines, has been deployed to Iraq five times. He serves with the 8th Communications Battalion of the 1st Marine Air Wing. He was born Sept. 30, 1983.

Pvt. David Allen Plassman joined the U.S. Army in July of this year. He attended basic training at Fort Stewart, Ga. and, Stark said, is currently in Oklahoma. He was born July 15, 1987.

Grandson Charles Russell Draper served with the U.S. Army and grandson Ryan Adam Switzer, from Indiana, is serving in California with the U.S. Marine Corps, Stark said.

To be included in the Veterans Hall, the veteran must have been born in Putnam County or attended elementary or high school in the county. Veterans who have lived in the county for at least 20 years and have been married for at least 20 years to a person who was born in the county or who attended school in the county are also eligible for inclusion, as well as veterans who have been buried in the county or who have lived in Putnam County and plan on being buried here after their death.

After retiring in 1990, Stark spent much of her time researching her genealogy and going cemetery hunting in and around Putnam County. She has collected directions to more than 340 old cemeteries in the area and catalogued who is buried in several of those. She shared that information with the Putnam County Library, she said, and continues to update information as she has time.

Her love of history, along with her gift for dowsing the location of graves, led her to a meeting with Putnam County Archivist Glenn Jones when she made a presentation for a group Jones belonged to. When Jones was named the archivist for the county and brought the idea of a veterans hall forward, he called on Stark to help.

"I enjoy it a great deal," she said of returning to work, on a volunteer basis, at the age of 80. "It keeps me and my mind active."

She is also happy to be helping families preserve their own histories through inclusion in the veterans hall, and enjoys being close to the collection of famed photographs and personal items on display.

"There's a feeling when I go back there," she said of the hall. "I hear the quietness. It's very calming."
