

REFLECTING ON BUFFALO VALLEY SCHOOL

You watched reflectively last week as a new historical marker proclaiming the Buffalo Valley school building, where you learned long division and direct objects, a historic place.



Memories flooded your consciousness, as you conjured images of schoolmates, most of them long departed, who during the Great Depression when the building came into existence were vital in developing your early persona.

You looked with deep appreciation at **Char Wanser** and **Barbara Markel**, residents who migrated to the community decades after your childhood there, and at **Carolyn Shanks Huddleston**, whose ancestors may have migrated there two centuries ago.

These three, along with their husbands and a battalion of others, spearheaded successful efforts that converted the

old school building into a model for community centers.

You saw the building come into existence in 1928-29, and your father, a farmer and a carpenter, had a role in its construction. You transferred from one-room Rock Springs School to Buffalo Valley's three-teacher school because your parents thought you would receive more individual attention.

It was there that **Nelle Sanders Beasley** drilled elements of grammar into your resistant brain, that **Dallas Leftwich**, your uncle and a principal, insisted you excel in arithmetic, and that **T. J. (Doc) Ford** gave you glimpses of the person you could become.

This building with its four large classrooms and auditorium also doubled as a community center during those days, but electricity, central heat and cooling, and indoor plumbing were to come years later.

In those depression years of unpaved roads and few motor vehicles, Buffalo Valley was to a major extent an isolated community. Radio sets were rare, most of your friends had never seen a "talking" movie, and horse-drawn vehicles provided family transportation.

You knew a family in Buffalo Valley who had a radio, and you and others stood under a shade tree in the yard to listen to a World Series game between St. Louis and Detroit featuring opposing stars Dizzy Dean and Tommy Bridges in a pitching duel.

You experienced your first case of "puppy love" during your eighth grade year at the school when you thought a pretty little seventh grader named **Frances Maddux** was the cutest brunette in the world. **Ann Jared** was generally acknowledged as the school's prettiest blonde.

As you watched the marker's unveiling and listened to the remarks by speakers, your mind turned to these two pretty girls who experienced tragic deaths early in life.

Your mind drifted as you viewed the old building, intentionally elevated to prevent flooding, with its generous "crawl space" high enough for us boys to engage in a prohibited activity.

It was under the floor that boys played marbles – for keeps – which was a form of gambling and against the rules. You played for keeps but kept few of the marbles. **Howard Kerr**, using a steel ball bearing as a taw, was a deadly shot and won a stocking full of marbles.

You remember being “behind” the other pupils in your class and how Miss Nelle helped you catch up. You improved so much you finished third from the top in your eighth grade class. You also finished third from the bottom – there were only five members of the class.

Jesse Evans was valedictorian, and **Myrna Ruth Bartlett** was salutatorian. She was your cousin, just as were many others, including **Frances Maddux**, your first love.

Indeed, it was not unusual for a fourth cousin to marry a fourth cousin. **Cornelia Bartlett**, another beautiful brunette, was your cousin.

“You once told me that you were in love with me,” she said generations later. Her memory was probably accurate. At the time, it seemed quite romantic to make such declarations. Clark Gable did it all the time.

Standing among a happy crowd of on-lookers, your emotions were mixed. You remembered **John T. Jared**, your schoolmate and neighbor, who died earlier this century.

Your memory turned to **Brownie Carr, Gus Medley, James Gambrell, Frye Maxwell, Robert Askew, Nelson Maddux, Joel Kerr, Ruby Neal, Buddy Alcorn, Kathleen Burch, Arthur Christian**, et al.

And you wondered where the outdoor basketball court, now overgrown with vegetation, was located. Our team played one game indoors, in Baxter.

You remember the ingredients of separation that scattered your schoolmates – World War II, migration to industrial centers in search of employment, finding the paths to higher education, wanderlust, and on and on.

The program ended and your reverie ended. Your mind focused on a pleasant anticipation – a great meal for all guests in the school building turned community center.

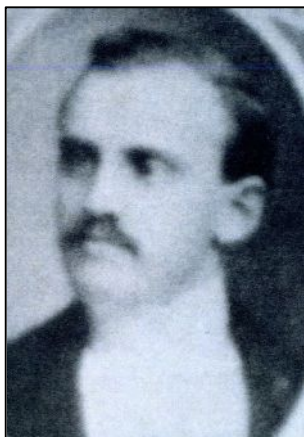

Triple Funeral Services Held For Members of Jared Family Killed in Traffic Collision.

Triple funeral services for Walter A. Jared, 68, Putnam County's magistrate, his daughter, Mrs. Ann Wilson King, 34, and granddaughter, Deborah Jo Jared, 7, were held Monday afternoon at the Buffalo Valley Presbyterian Church.

Mr. Jared who had served for several years as Justice of the Peace from the 11th Dist., died Sunday in Roane County Hospital, Harriman, from injuries received in a highway collision near Oak Ridge Saturday morning. Deborah Jo Jared, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Wirt Jared of Oak Ridge, was killed instantly in the same wreck and Mrs. King died shortly after being taken to the Harriman Hospital.

Critically injured in the wreck were Mrs. Alta W. Jared, 65, his wife, who is at Memorial Hospital, Chattanooga, and Michael Jared, 20 months, brother of Deborah Jo, who is in Oak Ridge Hospital. Marcia Jared, 3, another child of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Jared, was injured and is also at Oak Ridge Hospital. The children were reported in fair condition Tuesday, but Mrs. Jared's condition remained critical.

The accident was reported to have occurred at 10:15 a.m. on a road leading from Highway 70 to Oak Ridge when their car collided with a vehicle driven by Roy Parker of Kingston, on a rain-slick road. Parker was not seriously injured.

The Jared family were on their way to Oak Ridge taking the children to visit their mother who is in the hospital there. Mrs. King had come from Nashville to Buffalo Valley with her husband and 2 children, and had left them there while she accompanied her parents and the grandchildren on the trip to Oak Ridge.

The funeral services were conducted by Dr. Charles Sharpe and Rev. R. C. Arbaugh. Mrs. King was interred in the Cookeville Cemetery, and Mr. Jared and Deborah Jo in the Jared Cemetery at Buffalo Valley. (John and Ann Carr Jared Cemetery, Putnam Co., TN).

Besides his wife, Mr. Jared is survived by 2 other sons, Luke Allen Jared, Buffalo Valley and John T. Jared, Nashville; a brother, Wirt Jared of Buffalo Valley; 3 sisters, Mrs. Dave High, Cookeville, Mrs. Alta Lancaster, Lancaster, TN and Mrs. Goldie Nichols, Baxter; and 7 grandchildren.

Besides her parents, and brother and sister, Deborah Jo is survived by grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. John Farley of Carthage, and her grandmother, Mrs. W. A. Jared.

After Jack graduated from college, she retired as a teacher. She became a full time home-maker and a partner in the family investment business.

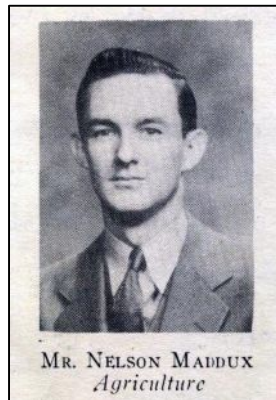
