REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIER'S GRAVE TO BE MARKED: By Tammy Stanford, Herald-Citizen Staff.

Jonathan Buck came here in 1818; his grave found by Virginia relative:

The area here west of the Cumberland Gap was once the "pioneer frontier" of America, drawing adventurers and those seeking refuge and land.

A Virginia man's quest to find the gravesite of one of those pioneers – a Revolutionary War soldier – has ended near Cookeville.

Jonathan Buck moved to present-day Putnam County about 1818, to a farm he received as part of the Revolutionary War land grant program.

He died in 1831 and was buried on the farm – located on Dry Valley Road near the White Plains community east of Cookeville and now owned by Harlan and Charlene Mullins.

John T. Buck, a retired professor from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and the great-great-great-grandson of Jonathan Buck, contacted the local Daughters of the American Revolution and Sons of the American Revolution about placing a Revolutionary War veteran's marker at the grave.

John T. Buck was found through his research that Jonathan Buck was a private in Captain George Enslaw's Company, First Battalion, Bedford Co., PA.

The ceremony to place the marker is set for Sat., June 24, at 10 a.m., with a reception afterwards.

The event is open to the public, but should be of special interest to the may Upper Cumberland descendants of Jonathan Buck, according to Eleanor Mitchell, regent of the Old Walton Road DAR chapter.

"Jonathan Buck and his wife, Zuriah Covalt Buck, had several children whose descendants live in the area," said Mrs. Mitchell. "For Putnam County, the placing of the marker is a rather historic event, and it is certainly so for his man who's worked so hard to find his ancestor."

According to a letter written by John T. Buck to DAR members, representatives from the fifth, sixth, and seventh generations of the Buck family will attend the ceremony.

"I am looking forward to the occasion that has been nearly 30 years coming – finding my great-great-great-grandfather Jonathan Buck's grave," wrote Buck.

Jonathan Buck was born January 12, 1755, in Pennsylvania, according to 'A History of Jonathan and Zuriah Covalt Buck's Descendants and Allied Families' by Katherine Raines Buck.

He is believed to be the son of Isaac Buck and Hannah Hicks. Isaac Buck sailed from England to America in 1752.

Jonathan Buck married Zuriah Covalt in Pennsylvania on March 16, 1775, and the moved to Carter County, Tennessee, in the early 1790s.

The Bucks later moved to what was then White and Jackson Counties. Putnam County was formed from part of White County in 1842.

Mrs. Buck died in 1819, and is buried in the same cemetery as her husband.

The couple had 12 children – Elizabeth, Thomas, Susanna, Elijah, Barbara, Jonathan Jr., Bethuel, Ephriam, Abigail, Miriam, Abraham and Isaac.

She was known as “Miss Hannah” to the hundreds of students she taught in her 44 years with the Putnam County School System. She attended school at Baxter Grammar School and Baxter Seminary. When she began her teaching career, she had to stand on a step stool to write at her chalk board because she was only 4’11” tall. During this time, she attended UT Knoxville, Murfreesboro, and earned her degree from Tennessee Polytechnic Institute. She retired from classroom teaching in 1975, but she didn’t retire from school activities. She regularly came to Baxter Elementary for storytelling to the lower grades. My first grad class always looked forward to Miss Hannah’s visit. If her storytelling extended into recess time, that was fine with the children. They wanted her to continue. Miss Hannah taught Sunday school for 60 years. She was a member of the Tennessee Teachers Hall of Fame, the Old Walton Road Chapter of the DAR, the Retired Teachers’ Association, and the Baxter Senior Citizens. She taught jazzercise at the age of 86 to the seniors at Boma. Miss Hannah married the late Frank Hall; they have two daughters, Laura Hall Jackson and Shelia Hall Wakefield. As a personal note, Miss Hannah was my first grade teacher when I started school in 1953. I also had Miss Hannah in the second grade, as she had a split first and second. From 1979-1980, she was a visiting student in mathematics at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, after which she again returned to the University of Florida, where in 1983, she received her Ph.D. in mathematics, with specialty in topology, the study of the properties of homeomorphic geometric configurations that are unaltered by elastic deformations.

In 1983, Dr. Mason accepted a position as an assistant professor in the Department of Mathematics at TTU. In 1984, she became chair of the department, a position which she held until 1996. **She was an organizing charter member of the Annuttaiaga Chapter, National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution**, a member of Alpha Delta Pi sorority, a member of Phi Beta Kappa scholastic honorary society, and a lifelong member of the First United Methodist church of Brooksville.

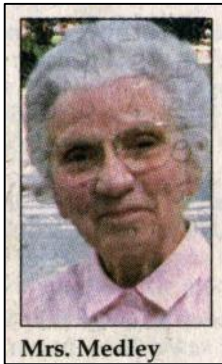

Eleanor Mitchell dead at 81

COOKEVILLE -- Eleanor Drake Mitchell, one of the Upper Cumberland's most accomplished and distinguished citizens, died at her home this morning. She was 81.

Dr. Mitchell, a retired college professor, fell ill from kidney disease only recently and, after undergoing some treatment, insisted on returning to her home to spend her last days.

She was known for her accomplishments and contributions in many fields, including scholarship in literature, public service in schools, civic efforts and her church and hobbies which ranged from aviation to genealogy.

She served on the Putnam School Board from 1980 until 1995, holding the chairmanship for one year.

Her distinguished academic career began back at Cookeville Central High School, where she graduated as valedictorian. She attended David Lipscomb College and later graduated from Tennessee Polytechnic Institute. She earned a Masters degree at the University of Tennessee, a PhD from the University of Maryland, and did post graduate work in Mexico and at Oxford University in England.

While still an undergraduate at TPI, she attended a 12-week civil aviation course at Austin Peay Normal School in conjunction with the war effort and after returning to Tennessee Tech, became the first woman to fly solo out of the Cookeville Airport. She later taught aviation courses at TPI.

She taught high school classes in West Tennessee and in Texas and later returned here to teach English at Tennessee Tech for more than 40 years.

She was nominated many times for the TTU Faculty of the Year award, and received that honor in 1988. She was a member of Phi Kappa Phi, Delta Kappa Gamma and Phi Delta Kappa honorary societies.

In addition to work in numerous other societies, she was a member of an international zoological expedition to Belize, Central America, in 1981. She belonged to the South Atlantic Modern Language Association, the Tennessee Philological Association in which she held various offices, and was a surveyor and member of the Reaffirmation Committee for the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

In 1987, she was named the first Putnam County Business Woman of the Year. She taught the Ladies Sunday School class at Jefferson Avenue Church of Christ for many years and was past president and treasurer for the Book Lovers Club.

She had been an active member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and was active in the Upper Cumberland Genealogical Association, holding several offices.

She published numerous articles, essays and papers throughout her career. In 1987, she presented a paper taken from her book, "Tete a Tetes and other Biography in the Town and Country Magazine 1769-1796," at the Seventh International Congress in the Enlightenment in Budapest, Hungary.

One of her proudest accomplishments was co-authorship of "The Draper Families in America."

She is listed in "Personalities of the South," "Outstanding Educators of America," "Directory of American Scholars," "Who's Who of American Women," and "International Who's Who."

FORMER RESIDENT; DIES OF WRECK INJURIES

Funeral services for Mrs. Rutledge Smith, 74, for many years a resident of Cookeville, were held Tuesday afternoon at the residence, on Lebanon Road. Dr. Walter R. Courtney and the Rev. Pickens Johnson officiated. Burial was in Cedar Grove cemetery, Lebanon.

Mrs. Smith died at 4 a.m. Sunday at Erlanger Hospital, Chattanooga, where she had been since September 3 when she sustained injuries in the accident on Signal Mountain near Chattanooga but was released from the hospital Monday.

A daughter of the late Andrew and Eudora Anderson McGregor, Mrs. Smith was born in Lebanon March 1, 1875. She received the Master of Arts degree from an annex of Cumberland University in 1893. Later she came to Cookeville, where she was actively engaged in the teaching profession for a number of years and was one of the leaders in the establishment of the Tennessee Polytechnic Institute.

She was married in Washington May 14, 1896. Major Smith who is chairman of the board of appeals of the State Selective Service, was an Army officer in World War I, has been a newspaperman and an engineer. Major Smith is a retired assistant to the president of the Tennessee Central Railway.

The Cookeville Press for ten years, while owned by Major Smith, was edited by Mrs. Smith. She participated in the establishing of the national Parent-Teachers Association in 1897 and had since been active in that association.

A member of First Presbyterian Church she had, since an early age, taught in Sunday schools of that church.

Mrs. Smith was active in the work of the Daughters of the American Revolution, having served as regent of Cumberland Chapter and as state chaplain. A great-great-niece of Rachel Jackson, wife of President Andrew Jackson, Mrs. Smith had served as president of the Daughters of 1812 and helped to compile a history of the Tennessee society. Several years ago, she was instrumental in having the portrait of Rachel

Jackson placed in the White House. In addition, through her various organizations she had assisted in erecting numerous historical monuments throughout the State. A resident of Nashville at the time of her death, Mrs. Smith had served as president of the American Legion Auxiliary there. While state Legion historian, she compiled records for the State on World War I veterans. The records were placed in the State Library. She had also served as State chaplain.

She had toured the state speaking in behalf of the WCTU. She had served as publicity chairman and a member of the executive committee of that organization.

Mrs. Smith served on the board of the State Federation of Women's Clubs for many years. She had membership in the Nashville Chapter of the Association for the Preservation of Virginia Antiquities. She organized and was president of the League of Southern Women Writers and was a member of the executive board for five years. A well-known author, Mrs. Smith had done some work on a history of Putnam County and had written the "History of Wilson County." She was a frequent contributor to historical magazines.

Mrs. Smith had visited every state in the union and had treasured collections from most of them. She had been a frequent visitor at the White House in Washington and was said to have been acquainted with every president since Grover Cleveland.

She had been a member of the Tennessee Historical Commission since its organization.

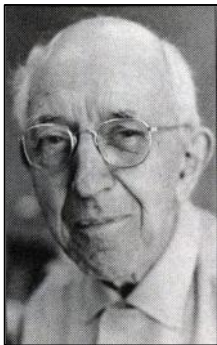
