Moss of Warren, Mich.; three sisters and two brothers-in-law, Geraldine and Zina Hedgecough and Myrtle Maxwell, all of Baxter, and Louise and Odis Herren of Dayton, Ohio; and two grandchildren, Jessica Eras Mines and Jason Anthony Mines, both of Chattanooga.

In addition to his parents, he was preceded in death by a sister, Reba (Mrs. Bill) Hart, and a brother-in-law, Olan Maxwell.

Linda Moss Mines – History Teacher of the Year

CHATTANOOGA – Linda Moss Mines, daughter of Louise Apple Moss of Baxter, and the late Marvin Amos Moss, has been named Tennessee's Outstanding American History Teacher for 2007 by the Tennessee Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Mines, chairman of the History and Social Sciences Department of the Girl Preparatory School (GPS) in Chattanooga, teaches Advanced Placement United States Government and Politics, Modern American Presidency, Constitutional Law and Advance Placement Modern European History. In addition to her responsibilities at GPS, she was recently appointed the Hamilton County historian by Mayor Claude Ramsey and the Hamilton County Commission.

Mines is actively involved in the Civil War Roundtable, serves as a special history correspondent for the Chattanooga Times-Free Press, volunteers as a consultant for WUTC-FM, Chattanooga's NPR station and frequently speaks to regional history and genealogical groups.

Mines and her husband, Tony, have two children and one grandchild. Their son, Jason and wife Catherine are employed in the family business, Art Creations, and have a daughter Sarah Claire. Their daughter, Jessica Eras Mines recently completed her MS in international law with honors from New York University and is currently a first-year student at Texas Wesleyan University of Law in Fort Worth.
