

AGED CITIZEN DIES AT HOME OF SON



James Alexander Boyd

James A. Boyd, Confederate veteran and one of the best-known and most highly respected citizens of Putnam County, died Friday at his home in Baxter. He was 83 years old and had spent his entire life in this county, except during his four years service in the Confederate army.

He volunteered in April 1861, as a soldier in Capt. H. H. Dillard's company of Col. John H. Savage's regiment. He spent the last several months of the war as a prisoner in the Rock Island federal prison. He devoted his life to farming.

From his young manhood he was a member of the Southern Methodist Church. He served for 25 years as superintendent of the Sunday school of the noted old Pleasant Grove Methodist Church, the oldest Methodist church in this county.

In his young-manhood he married Miss Fannie Nichols of this county, who died several years ago. He is survived by three grown children, J. Cohn Boyd, and D. B. Boyd of Baxter and Mrs. Henry Holleman of Granville. A son, W. L. Boyd, died about two years ago.

Several hundred people, from over Putnam county were present at the funeral service at Baxter Sunday afternoon. Services were conducted on the lawn of the home by the Rev. J. D. Harris and Dr. H. L. Upperman. The Baxter, Rock Springs and Granville Masonic lodges conducted funeral services at the grave.

On every hand the most glowing tributes were paid the deceased. His record of fifty years as a steward in old Pleasant Grove church and his long service as superintendent of its Sunday school were referred to by hundreds of people. Many old men and women, who had known him intimately all their lives, stated that he was never known to make an unkind remark about any person but upon the other hand, he always greeted everyone, old and young with words of encouragement and appreciation.

Had he lived until December, he would have been 84 years old, but until his death his mind and memory were perfectly clear and unimpaired and every Sunday saw him active in Sunday school and church work.

He was the oldest member of the Rock Springs Masonic Lodge, also the oldest Mason in Putnam county.

He was the last surviving confederate soldier of Company "F" of the 16th Tennessee Regiment, Capt. Dillard's company, which was the Putnam county company first organized.

In addition to his children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren, he is survived by many other relatives and a host of friends in this county who will always revere his memory.

In April, 1861, James Alexander volunteered as a soldier in the first company of Confederate soldiers organized in Putnam Co., TN. This was Company F of the Sixteenth Tennessee Regiment, being the company of Capt. H. H. Dillard and in the Regiment of Col. John H. Savage. James served four years in the Confederate Army. During the last several months of the Civil War, he was confined as a prisoner in the Rock Island Federal Prison in IL, having been captured by the federals, as he lay wounded on the

battlefield. His devotion to the "lost cause" never wavered. He attended every general reunion of the Confederate veterans as long as he lived.

Born on 4 December 1843, in Jackson Co, the son of John C. Boyd and Martha Holladay.

Enlisted in the 16th Tennessee on the 9 June 1861, but was discharged as a non conscript 16 July 1862.

Enlisted in A Company, (Colonel R. D.) Allison's (Tennessee) Cavalry (Squadron) on the 10 February 1863.

Wounded at Chickamauga on 18 September 1863 when wounded in the left hip by exploding shell.

Captured near Alexandria, DeKalb Co, 24 August 1864 and sent to various prisons, the last being Rock Island.

He spent his life being a farmer.

From his young manhood he was a member of the Southern Methodist Church and served for 25 years as superintendent of the Sunday school of the noted old Pleasant Grove Methodist Church. And was a member of the Rock Springs Masonic Lodge.

Married Rhoda Frances 'Fannie' Nichols. They had six children.

Pension #1208 filed 21 October 1902 and granted 2 April 1906. Many people wrote on his behalf and his claim eventually granted.

Died 7 October 1927 and is buried in the James A. Boyd Cemetery, Baxter, TN.



LADONIA, TEXAS, 1920. James Alexander Boyd, of Putnam County, Tennessee, is shown here in the UCV uniform he wore to the annual reunions of the United Confederate Veterans. Accompanied by his daughter, Zora Holleman, and with train tickets that entitled them to travel for a month, he seized the opportunity provided by the Houston reunion and spent the month visiting relatives in Texas. In this photo, he is surrounded by his son, Lem Boyd (standing); his daughter, Verna Osborne (standing next to Lem); her sons, Charles Wesley Osborne (standing in front of Lem); James Leslie Osborne (standing in front of Verna), and M. D. Osborne (standing in front of James); and the elderly veteran's other daughter, Edna Combs, who holds her daughter, Kathleen, on her lap. Boyd joined Co. K, 16th Tennessee Infantry, on June 9, 1861. Discharged due to ill health, he joined the cavalry on February 10, 1863, and served with Co. A, Allison's Cavalry, until captured and sent to a prison camp. After the War, he was a pillar of the community, living to the age of 83. A strict Methodist and Mason, his well-attended funeral was held on the front lawn of his home.
