NORTH CAROLINA -- Memorial services for **Medora (Dodie) Maddux Corder Hurst**, of Carol Woods, N.C., will be held Thursday, Jan. 19, at Carol Woods Assembly Hall in Chapel Hill, N.C. Private graveside services will be at Maddux Family Cemetery at Locust Hill Farm in Martins Creek Community of Putnam County at a later date.

Mrs. Hurst died Thursday, Jan. 12, 2006, in Carol Woods Retirement Community.

She was born May 30, 1904, in Granville to the late **Thomas Jefferson Maddux and Margaret Medora Burton Maddux**.

Mrs. Hurst attended Tennessee Polytechnic Institute in Cookeville and George Peabody College in Nashville.

While in Fayetteville with her **first husband, Frank C. Corder**, Mrs. Hurst actively served both her church and community. She served in numerous offices in the Women of the Church. In recognition of her dedicated service, she was awarded an honorary Life Membership in the Women of the Church in 1969. She was an active member of the Cape Fear Valley Hospital Auxiliary, which she helped organize. She also served on the Salvation Army Board and the Fayetteville Woman's Program, a civic beautification project.

In 1975 Mrs. Hurst married her **second husband, Robert Gordon Hurst**. In 1980 the couple became residents of Carol Woods.

Her family includes two sisters, Mary Freeman Maddux Morrell and Eleanor Maddux; a stepson, Grant Hurst; numerous nieces including Martha Sue Williford and Nancy Lefever; a number of nephews, great-nieces and great-nephews; a great-great-nephew; and a great-great-niece.

In addition to her parents and her husbands, Mrs. Hurst was preceded in death by two sisters, Frances Maddux Ulmer and Martha Beasley Maddux Breeding, and two brothers, Thomas Burton Maddux and Ralph Maddux.

Sgt. Thomas Jefferson Lee Obt.

b. 17 October 1834 - d. 27 October 1923, Putnam Co., TN, (Co. K, 17th Tennessee Infantry (CSA), md on the 15th of May 1866 to **Tennessee Stanton**, b. 16 August 1851 – d. 3 January 1906. Their daughter **Lillian Lee** (1889-1925) md on the 22nd of July 1915, Putnam Co., TN to **William Grover Anderson** (1889-1970), s/o **Lewis Monroe Anderson** (1867-1935) & **Matilda Isabelle Wallace** (1872-1956). Lillian and Wm. G. Anderson are both buried in Cookeville City Cemetery, Putnam Co., TN.

Thomas Jefferson Lee, Confederate veteran, and one of the most prominent and highly respected citizen of this section of the state, died at his home in the Tenth civil district of this county last Thursday, Nov. 1. He was 88 years old and had been prominently identified with the public life of Putnam county almost from the organization of the county.



He was gallant Confederate soldier, and having been wounded and captured by the Federals, he was confined for fourteen months as a prisoner of war in the Federal prison, Fort Delaware, from which he was pardoned by President Lincoln later in the afternoon of the same day in which President Lincoln was assassinated. Facts relative to the issuance of his pardon by President Lincoln, known to the deceased and his friends at the time, convinced them that the granting of the pardon was the last official act of President Lincoln on that fateful day in the evening of which he suffered martyrdom.

The deceased was, for many years, a successful merchant and owned one of the best farms in this section of the state.

He was for many years active and influential in the political life of this county and section.

His wife died several years ago. He is survived by three sons and five daughters, as follows: John M. Lee, and T. J. Lee, Jr., of this county, Robert T. Lee of Nashville, Mrs. John E. Oliver and Mrs. Charles A. Reagan of this city, Mrs. William Grover Anderson of Baxter and Mrs. Mollie Whitley and Mrs. Mattie Gwaltney of Gordonsville. Also by one brother, Hop T. Lee, of this county.

The Civil War experiences of Granville, an important Cumberland River port in the nineteenth century, were similar to many rural Upper Cumberland communities. When Tennessee seceded in 1861, most residents backed the Confederacy.

Granville was a contested area for both Confederate and Union cavalry from 1863 to 1865. In the spring and summer of 1863, the 8th Texas Cavalry (SCA) was stationed in Granville while preparing to attack Union-occupied Carthage in neighboring Smith County. In the fall of 1864, the 1st Tennessee Mounted Infantry (USA) used Granville as a base and also camped across the Cumberland River from the town.

Several Granville residents served in the Confederate army. Sidney Smith Stanton, a prominent Granville attorney and state senator at age 30, strongly encouraged secession. He enlisted as a private in Co. F, 25th Tennessee Infantry (CSA), in July 1861. Stanton recruited more than 1,000 men from neighboring counties. Promoted to colonel, he organized the 84th Tennessee Infantry in 1862. After surviving several battles, Stanton was killed during the Atlanta Campaign.

Sgt. Thomas Jefferson Lee, Co. K, 17th Tennessee Infantry (CSA), was captured here in 1864 while recruiting volunteers in Granville. Lee was one of a group of Confederate soldiers pardoned by President Lincoln on April 14, 1865, just one day before the president's death. Lee later returned to Granville to marry Col. Stanton's relative **Tennessee Stanton**, whom he had promised to marry when she was just a baby. Lee is buried in the family cemetery on Martins Creek Road.

It flourished and flowered and shone on those about her because it was very warp and woof of her being. Here religion and ideals manifested themselves not in chill austerity and fault-finding of others chosen conduct, but in cheeriness, kindness and justice; nor did it rob her of her gentle sense of humor.

Though an interesting and most intelligent conversationalist with a rich sparkle of humor, yet her converse was never smirched by unkind or critical comments on others. Nor was friend, conscience, nor justice ever sacrificed on the altar of unfair and unjust material gain.

And such attributes and characteristics are the very essence of spiritual food. Such characters and such lives are the threads from which have been woven the stability and purity of our America. Were the whole world made up of such as she, there would be little need for endless peace plan discussions.

What greater tribute could be extended to one, who while leaving behind her in her community, the richness of her influence to live forever, has passed on to the Great beyond, bearing her golden sheaves of righteousness and useful living to lay at the feet of the Creator of all things.

The shrines of such women are their homes. And there was no exception to this rule. Here fidelity to home and family was awarded by love and courtesy from her children and her children's children. In that home of all those years of her married life, gracious hospitality has for all those years, warmed the hearts of the many guests, in the traditional southern style, assembled around its ample fireside in winter, and in summer in the shadow of its long-porch which looks out across road, fields and fringed stream to the hills beyond.

And thus we know her – we, who are not even of blood ties. And thus also, her children and grandchildren, her sisters and brother have known her. The world needs more of such as she.

Note: "Warp and woof" as a figure of speech is very old and is indeed drawn from the weaving of cloth. The "warp" of a fabric is the threads running lengthwise that form the background or framework for the cloth. "Warp" in this sense comes from the Old English word "wearp," meaning "to cast a net," and is separate from our modern verb sense of "warp" meaning "to twist out of shape." The "woof" of a woven fabric is the threads running across the "warp," and was originally "oof," from the Old English "owef," meaning "to weave." "Oof" became "woof" around 1540 simply because "warp and woof" is so much easier to say than "warp and oof."

Put together, "warp and woof" makes a nice metaphor for any tight interweaving of disparate elements, as in this quotation from 1882: "The woof of self-interest is so cunningly interwoven with the warp of righteous feeling that very few of us can tell where the threads cross." One might also speak of the "warp and woof" of daily life, meaning all the experiences from which our existence is woven.

And, since someone out there is bound to ask, the Fido sort of "woof" is unrelated to any of this and simply represents an oppressive humano-centric attempt to imitate the sound of a dog's bark.

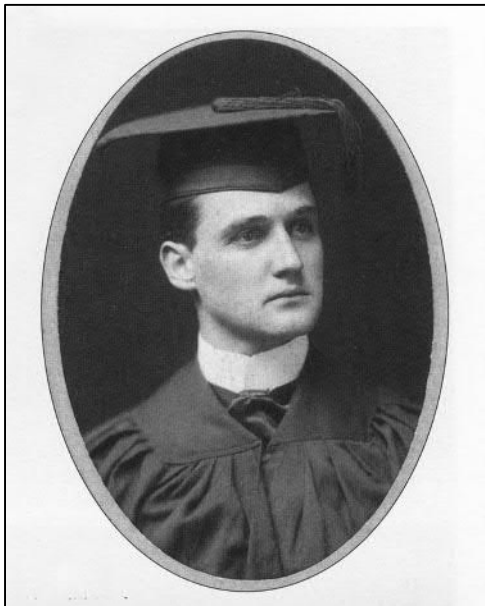

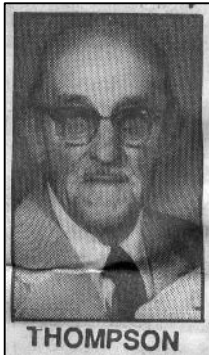

Services Set For Law Enforcement Veteran:



Paul Lillard Thompson, who served Cookeville as police chief in the early 1960's and who was for many years before that the only Tennessee Highway Patrol officer in this district, died Tuesday, March 19, at his home in Granville. He was 83.

Funeral services will be held Friday, March 22, 1991, at 10:30 a.m. in the chapel of Hooper & Huddleston Funeral Home with Rev. R. L. Freeman and Rev. Tom Smith officiating. Burial will be in the Maddux Cemetery in Putnam County. The family will receive friends at the funeral home today from 3 to 5 p.m. and from 7 to 9 p.m.

A native of Putnam County, Mr. Thompson was the son of the late James B. and Mary Sherrell Thompson.

Thompson is remembered by retired Cookeville Police Chief Bill Bilyeu as a "very dedicated officer of the law" who wanted very much to rid Cookeville of pinball machine gambling.

"He was police chief in the early 1960's when I was the sheriff, and we worked together, and I was always impressed by him," Bilyeu said. "He always looked so neat and professional in his uniform – he was a proud officer.

Bilyeu also remembers Thompson's days as the whole Upper Cumberland Area's only Highway Patrol officer, back in the 1930's when Bilyeu was just a teenager.

"He rode a motorcycle and patrolled the whole region by himself – he'd go in and check the beer joints all by himself," Bilyeu said. "There was no Highway Patrol headquarters here then. Later on they finally got Paul a car to use in his patrolling."

"I remember that he was tough on criminals," Bilyeu said.

When Thompson was police chief, the city had a police force of about five or six men, Bilyeu said.

Thompson's career in law enforcement also included work as an investigator for the State Alcoholic Beverage Commission.

His family includes his daughter-in-law, Sue S. Thompson of Cookeville; two grandchildren, Annette and Robert Martin Thompson, both of Cookeville; five sisters, Lucille Thompson of Murfreesboro, Hazel Patton of Cookeville, Virginia, Velma Thompson of Cookeville, and Betty Rose West of Roanoke, VA; and one brother, James Thompson of Manchester, CA.

Mr. Thompson was preceded in death by his wife, Liza Freeman Thompson, his son, Paul Martin Thompson, and his sister, Anna Ruth Tigie.

Active pallbearers will be Ralph Maddux, Harold Carter, James Lee Wright, Robert Harris, Freeman Neal, Kenneth Turner, and Thomas Burton Maddux.

Note: Before the advancement of [modern medicine](#) acute renal failure might be referred to as uremic poisoning. [Uremia](#) was the term used to describe the contamination of the [blood](#) with [urine](#). Starting around [1847](#) this term was used to describe reduced urine output, now known as [oliguria](#), that was thought to be caused by the urine mixing with the blood instead of being voided through the [urethra](#).

Acute renal failure due to [acute tubular necrosis](#) (ATN) was recognized in the [1940s](#) in the United Kingdom, where crush victims during the [Battle of Britain](#) developed patchy necrosis of renal tubules, leading to a sudden decrease in renal function.^[3] During the Korean and Vietnam wars, the incidence of ARF decreased due to better acute management and intravenous infusion of fluids.^[4]

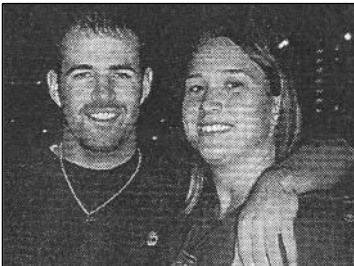

GRANVILLE, TN UNVEILS CIVIL WAR TRAIL MARKERS.

GRANVILLE – The Tennessee Department of Tourist Development is currently developing Civil War Trails for Tennessee which is part of a multi-state program that identifies, interprets and creates driving tours of both the great campaigns and the lesser-known Civil War sites.

Noell Rembert, Civil War heritage from the Department of Tourist Development, was present for the



dedication and stated that there are now 108 Civil War Trail sites in Tennessee with a goal of having 300 by 2012. A statewide map guide will be available in December of this year so driving tours can begin in Tennessee.

The Granville marker titled “The Civil War In Granville” states Granville was a contested area for both Confederate and Union cavalries from 1863-1865.

In the spring and summer of 1863, the 8th Texas Cavalry (SCA) was stationed in Granville while preparing to attack Union-occupied Carthage. In the fall of 1864, the 1st Tennessee Mounted Infantry (USA) used Granville as a base and also camped across the Cumberland River from Granville. The marker honors Granville resident Col. Sidney Stanton, a prominent Granville attorney and state senator at age 30 who strongly encouraged secession. He enlisted as a private in Co. F, 25th Tennessee Infantry (CSA), in July 1861.

Stanton recruited more than 1,000 men from neighboring counties.

Promoted to colonel, he organized the 84th Tennessee Infantry in 1862.

After surviving several battles, Stanton was killed during the Atlanta Campaign.

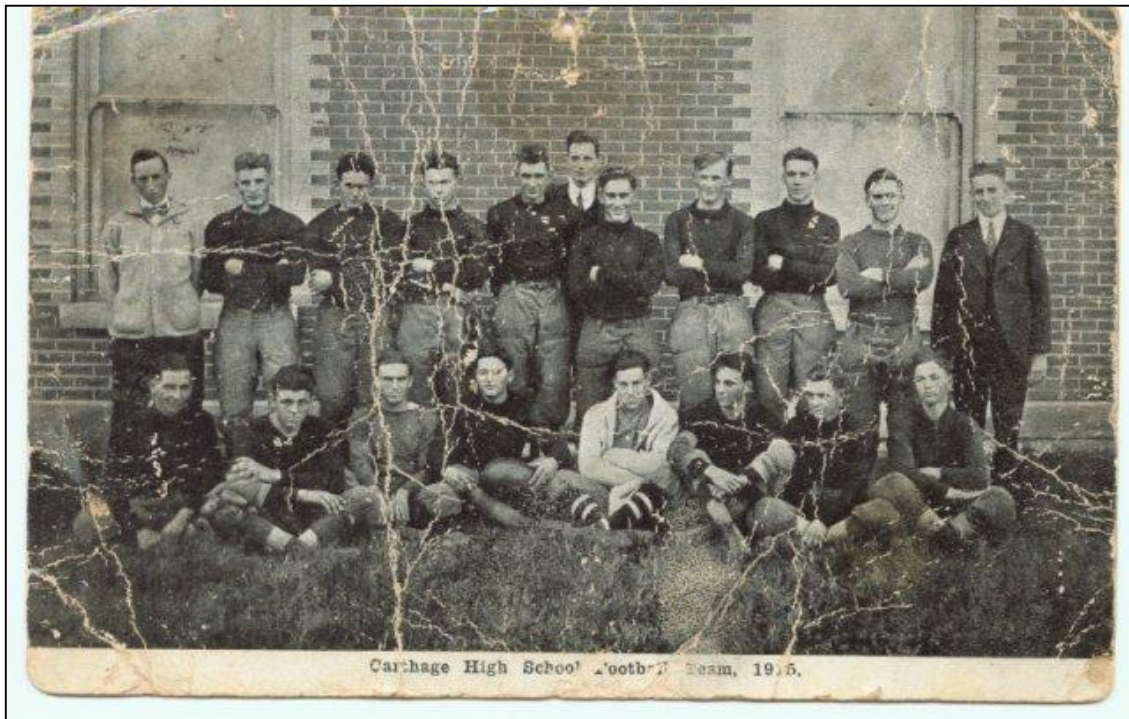
The marker also honors Sgt. Thomas Jefferson Lee, Co. K, 17th Tennessee Infantry (CSA), who was captured in Granville while recruiting volunteers in his hometown. Lee was one of a group of Confederate

soldiers pardoned by President Abraham Lincoln on April 14, 1865, just one day before the president's death. Lee later returned to Granville to marry Col. Stanton's relative, Tennessee Stanton, whom he had promised to marry when she was just a baby.

On Oct. 24, 1885, 5,000 Confederate veterans reunited at Granville to pay tribute to Col. Stanton's memory. Thomas J. Lee's Co. K, 17th Tennessee Infantry, held reunions in Granville with both Confederate and union veterans from 1885 to 1920.

"We are honored to have this marker in Granville and to be part of the great Civil War Trail," said Randall Clemons, president of Granville Museum.

"Both of these men deserve honoring as well as many other men of Granville that served. Granville will hold a special event in October 2010 to memorialize the 125th anniversary of the Oct. 24, 1885, grand event. Granville Museum is in process of completing a special exhibit in the museum on Stanton and Lee."

Granville is located two miles from the Putnam County line so all of our doctors have practiced in Putnam County.

Dr. Luther Martin Freeman- Graduated from University Tennessee Medical School and immediately started his practice in Granville in 1906. In 1907 **he married Ethel Maddux** and they lived in her family home which is in Putnam County two miles from Granville. His doctor's office is still in Granville beside the Granville Museum. He was the longest serving postmaster of Granville as well. He practiced until his death in 1973 at age 94. His office has been preserved with a monument and the bridge in Granville is named in his honor.

The other doctors who have practiced in Granville are **Dr. William B. Holmes** in the early 1800's and then his two son in laws practiced by the name of **Dr. William Burchett Page** and **Dr. Benjamin Lewis Simmons Jr.** Dr. Page practiced in Granville all his life and Dr. Simmons later went to Nashville to practice. **Dr. Albert Allison Ferrell** practiced in Granville from the late 1800s until his death in 1905. His home still stands behind the museum. **Dr. Hugh Brown Smith** practiced in Granville in the early 1900's and moved to Nashville in 1918.

You can see for a small community that we have a strong medical history. We don't have a copy of Dr. Dudney report that we can send to you. HERITAGE DAY TO INCLUDE MOTORCYCLE SHOW

Tuesday, April 2009

GRANVILLE – the 11th annual Granville Heritage Day on May 23 will have the first annual Ralph Maddux Memorial Motorcycle Show as part of its day of celebration. This show will consist of 18 classes of competition with three place trophies in each class with a \$10 entry fee. The show will be sponsored by boswell's Motorcycles who is the Harley Davidson dealer in Cookeville. The show will be held on the vacant lot next to Granville Market.

Ralph Maddux was born in 1918 in the Granville Community in the edge of Putnam County on Martins Creek. He was the youngest of seven children and was small in size with a great love of animals, but didn't have the love of farming that his brother and father had. His interest centered on motorbikes, one of which he had seen in a Sears and Roebuck catalog. After many months of collecting and selling scrap iron, he earned enough money to order it. This machine was his pride and joy and his cousin wrecked it.

One family story said he was sent to the neighbors about a mile away to borrow some extra hoes for the work hands to hoe the tobacco. He went on the motorcycle that now had only one handlebar. When he returned to the tobacco patch carrying the hoes, he lost control and took down several rows of tobacco. His brother told their father that he thought an airplane had landed. Needless to say, his father was not pleased.

Maddux joined the National Guard and volunteered for active duty before the Cookeville unit was called during WWII where he served as a supply sergeant. While in France he discovered a motorcycle the Germans had left behind in a grease pit. After it was inspected for "booby traps," he pulled it out and was able to fix it. He carried it in the supply truck and rode it at every opportunity.



A few months before his death in 2002, his granddaughter asked him what he did with the motorcycle before leaving to come home. He said he couldn't remember exactly, but he thought that he gave it to another GI.

During his overseas duty with the 269th Field Artillery Unit he received the Bronze Star for climbing to the top of a building where a 5-caliber machine gun was mounted and successfully engaged with a German fighter aircraft.

After the war he returned to the farm and raised cattle and baled hay in the community of Granville. In 1956 he secured a Harley-Davidson dealership and opened the first Harley store in Cookeville at 39 West

Spring Street across the street from the Cookeville Pure Milk Company and the Dairy Queen. He owned and operated this store until 1974 and was the only dealership between Nashville and Knoxville.

His last project before selling his shop in 1974 was to rebuild two Harleys, a 1930 and a 1934. The 1934 was completed but the 1930 was never finished to his satisfaction. ONE MADDUX FAMILY'S JOURNEY

Alexander Mattock arrived in America in October 1635 on the "Abraham of London". He was born in Wales in 1613 and died in North Hampton County, Virginia in 1659. There were fifty-one passengers on the "Abraham of London". Alexander's presence on that ship is documented in "The Original List of People of Quality" by John Camden Hotten (1874). He was twenty-two years old at the time of the voyage.

Records tell us that Alexander's descendants migrated to Somerset County, Maryland and then back to Virginia before coming to Tennessee and other areas. We do not know the reason for this migration, probably in search of more land that had not been worn out by so much tobacco farming.

Alexander's great-great grandson, William Maddux, also of Virginia, served in the Continental Army as a sergeant. William's son, Craven, was the first of our ancestors to move to Tennessee. Craven most assuredly came to Tennessee by horseback or wagon. We don't know why he left Bedford County, Virginia, but he settled on land in Buffalo Valley, Tennessee, which at the time was part of Jackson County. He was a farmer and also helped survey the boundaries for Putnam County. Evidence of his grist mill can still be seen in a creek on the Shanks Farm. Craven and his wife, Betsy Davis, have monuments in the Maddux Cemetery on the same farm.

Craven had ten children one of which was Thomas Jefferson Maddux who was born in 1814. He settled in the Rock Springs Community near Buffalo Valley. He and his wife Elizabeth Garrett, had fourteen children. Thomas and Elizabeth are buried in another family cemetery located on the Medley Farm.

Robert Fain Maddux, Thomas's eleventh child and my great grandfather, married Martha Stanton and made their home a few miles away in the Martin Creek Community near Granville. They built a beautiful southern home which now is known as the Dr. Freeman Home. Robert or Bob, as he was called, is credited, along with two others, with capturing the bandits of the last stagecoach robbery in October 1882.

Martha Stanton and Bob Maddux had three children, one of which was Thomas Jefferson Maddux. He married Maggie Burton of Granville and they also made their home on Martin Creek. They had eight children one of which was Ralph, whose daughters still own the Martin Creek property today.

Alexander Maddox who came to American in 1635 had many descendants. This is only one of many Journey Stories that could be written.
