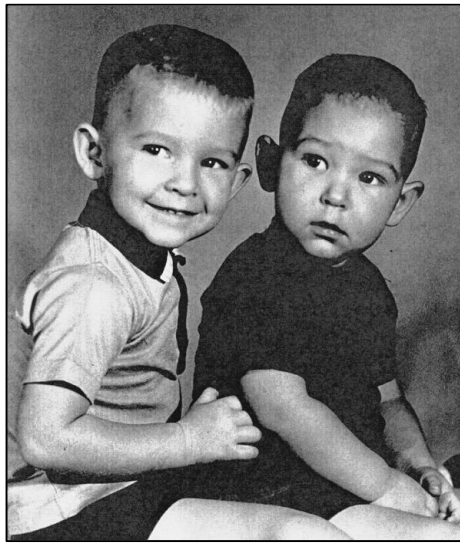

DENNY, LESLIE: Accidentally Shoots Himself at Granville - This community was shocked by the receipt of news Monday morning that **Leslie Denny** had accidentally shot and killed himself at the home of his father-in-law, Mr. Trousdale, at Granville. Leslie was the son of Judge T. L. Denny of this city, and about 20 years of age. He leaves a widow and one child. The remains were brought here for interment, the funeral occurring Tuesday evening. INTRODUCTION:

Granville is located on the Cumberland River in north central Tennessee. It was settled in the early 1800's by Scotch-Irish descendants from Granville County, North Carolina. These family names included Burtons, Dukes, Montgomerys, Pages, Raglands, Dalers, Shepherds, Smiths, Terrys, Tittles, and Williamsons. The earliest settlers were farmers. Tobacco, corn, hay, cattle, hogs, and lumber were the main products.

On the western edge of the Cumberland Mountains, with rugged hills and narrow valleys, ground travel was difficult and often impossible in bad weathers. A river provided transportation to market and a way for settlers to receive goods. Granville became a riverboat town. Warehouses sprang up along a half-mile of river. Furniture, hardware, and groceries arrived by boat. Bob Meadows, a riverboat captain, told his family that Granville was known as Banana Town.

Often, up to 45 paddle wheelers traveled the Cumberland River from Nashville to Burnside, Kentucky. They provided comfortable first-class cabins on the top deck for travelers. Maid service and even childcare was available. Freight going upriver or agricultural products being sent downriver were stowed on the lower decks.

River travel was difficult. It was treacherous in the fall, winter, and spring, when the rains might produce much debris. Large logs floated downriver and shifting sandbars grounded boats. Many boats sank. The *I. T. Rhea* sank and was raised a total of 12 times. The 13th time it sank just a few miles above Granville, and the owners left it there. Divers later brought up treasures including tableware and the ship's bell.

The river provided another means of revenue. Fine old trees were logged and floated down the local creeks to the Cumberland River. Once on the Cumberland, they were tied together for the journey downriver, where they would be sold.

Early settlers brought slaves with them. Houses, rock fences, even roads, as well as the farm labor, flourished thanks to their efforts. This fact contributed to strong sentiments for the labor, flourished thanks to their efforts. This fact contributed to strong sentiments for the Confederacy. Company K survivors and friends gathered for a reunion in Granville.

The settlers were education-minded, securing a charter from the state legislature in the mid-1830's for a private school. It was to offer "the finest in education" to local and boarding students. Other private schools flourished before public schools were initiated in 1922.

Residents volunteered to serve with Andrew Jackson, nicknamed "Old Hickory," in the War of 1812. World War I and II saw large numbers serve valiantly. Numerous Gold Stars reflected the loss of lives of local men. An active American Legion chapter flourished in Granville for

many years after World War II. Throughout the Cold War, including the Korean and Vietnam Conflicts, locals volunteered to serve their country.

World War II engineering companies trained by building pontoon bridges across the Cumberland during military training maneuvers in 1943 and 1944. Several tent cities sprang up, and local farmland became military locations. This combat training affected both the economy and the lives of locals. Many of these men were invited into local homes. Off-duty time was spent in stores, barbershops, and other establishments. Several local women married men from those units.

The first settlers were Presbyterian. Soon, a log-cabin church, known as the Concord Assembly, was built near the banks of the Cumberland River. Each August for many years a large camp meeting was held. Families came to camp and attended religious services for a week. A second log cabin was built in the village, to be replaced by a large, two-story frame church a few years before 1900. Upstairs were meeting rooms for the local Masonic Lodge, and downstairs was the sanctuary, which was also used as the location of the private high school. In the mid-1800's, a Methodist church was formed, and then a Christian church organized. In 1939, a Baptist church was added to the community. These churches were not only the religious centers of the community, they were the social and educational centers as well. At least two private schools operated in church buildings. Community celebrations of Christmas, Easter, and other holidays were important events. It was there that babies were christened, and it was definitely there that weddings occurred.

By the early 1900's, in addition to the numerous churches, the town boasted a bank, local doctors, several general stores, a funeral home, post office, hotel, blacksmith shop, barbershop, beauty shop, saloon, and even an icehouse. A local ferry provided transportation across the river for local farmers to do business, seek medical care, or vote in county elections.

Athletic endeavors were a big part of recreation. The junior high school competed in basketball. There were basketball teams in the area as early as 1915. There were sandlot baseball teams also competing with other nearby teams. Many young people who first played basketball in Granville went on to county high-school teams, and five state championship teams have been coached by Granville natives.

In 1972, the Cordell Hull Dam was completed and a TVA lake impounded downstream from Granville. Many homes along the river were moved or destroyed to make way for the lake. The lake brought a marina, fishing, water sports, and retirees who wanted a home near the lake. Granville changed from a thriving farming center to a busy recreation destination with an RV campground, swimming pool, and fishing tournaments. Farms still exist, but few are the sole source of income.

A museum, bank, volunteer fire hall, antique and gift shop, real estate office, post office, and marker, in addition to the Granville Marina, Maple Grove Campground, the restored Ben Sutton General Store, and the Granville Bed and Breakfast, now offer services to the community.
