Former Pilot reporter covered wide range of stories

VIRGINIA BEACH — Joseph V. Phillips, a reporter and editor at The Virginian-Pilot for almost 40 years, died Saturday. He was 75.

Phillips, who started at the newspaper in 1956, covered a wide range of beats, including business, the city of Chesapeake, police, education and features.

"He was a very diligent reporter," said Tony Stein, a columnist for The Pilot's Chesapeake Clipper community tabloid. Stein worked with Phillips in Chesapeake.

"He was very careful with his facts," Stein said. "I always admired his ability to go after a story and tell it well."

During the 1960s, Phillips wrote about funding issues in Chesapeake and later covered problems facing Virginia Electric & Power Co.

He was a feature writer for a time and edited a youth-oriented supplement called Action.

Stein remembered Phillips as a friendly man who knew how to dress and could often be found in the newspaper's smoking area.

"He was a very gentlemanly person, with a good sense of humor," Stein said.

Phillips traveled the world pursuing his passions for art history, religion, genealogy and writing.

He was predeceased by his brother, Jack McKinney; a sister, Shirley V. Tilton; and two foster sons, Ho "Michael" Odom and Seri "David" Tang. He is survived by three foster grandsons and five foster granddaughters.
