**COOKEVILLE** – So much can happen in 100 years.

Yesterday, to celebrate its rich history, the in Cookeville kicked off a centennial

celebration, one complete with church services, lunch and special guests.



The vent concluded with the dedication of a time capsule, which, when buried, will contain several mementos, documenting the church's history – the day's bulletin, a group photo of the congregation and an outline of the church's past.

In 1909, the church secured property

at 20 N. Dixie Ave., the same year that the state Supreme Court declared that the union of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the Presbyterian Church in the United States of



America was unconstitutional.

Though both denominations shared the same sanctuary alternate Sundays, anti-unionists the emboldened were by the Landrith v. decision Hudgins and demanded that Presbyterians the surrender property, according

to a excerpt published in the church's September bulletin.

They did so in October, and in November they purchased from Jere Whitson the property where First Presbyterian Church now sits. A cornerstone was dedicated in 1910.

Pastor Pat Handlson said the celebration will continue through the rest of the year.
