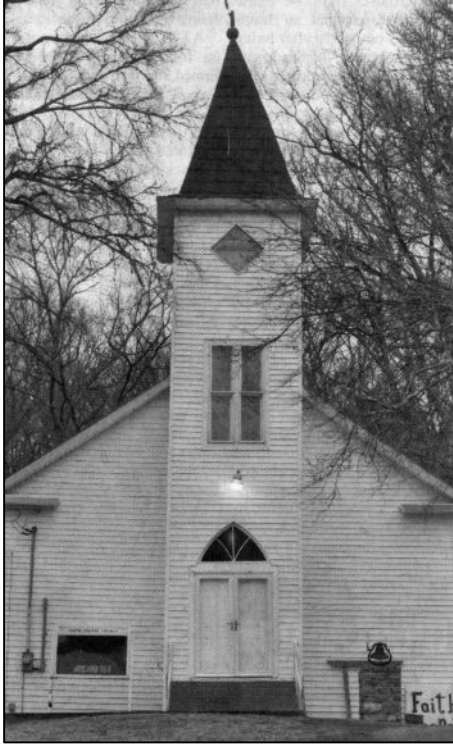


BLACK FAMILIES LEFT A LEGACY FOR PROGENY

PUTNAM COUNTY – Near the site of the old Rock Springs Valley school building in western Putnam County, a hillside offers final rest for early residents, uniting in one communal cemetery the remains of members of two races.



An invisible line of demarcation marks the separation of long deceased residents of African heritage from Caucasian descendants. Today, decades of trees and entangling vines obscure graves of pioneers of both races who shaped the valley's culture and developed a thriving community.

The history of Rock Springs Valley would be incomplete without attention to the African-Americans who before World War II lived throughout the widespread community.

Although there were several black families then, I am concentrating here on the Maddux families who lived on farmland west of the road that runs in front of the Rock Springs church building.

These families were highly respected. Through their diligence, energy and thrift, they made farming profitable for landowners. Indeed, some of the black farmers of Rock Springs in those years also were landowners.

My favorite black adult in my boyhood was Wilburn Maddux, who owned and operated a gristmill. In those years, I would shuck and shell corn on our hand-cranked sheller – about a bushel of grain, which was placed in a special cornmeal sack. Then, I divided equally the grain in the sack and loaded it on the back of a horse.

I loved the gristmill and talking with Wilburn Maddux who, despite his years of wisdom, never talked “down” to me.

A motor from a Model-T Ford automobile powered his mill. A belt connected the mill and the engine.

It's doubtful anyone else could have operated the mill. After he cranked the engine, he turned a corn cob to adjust the flow of fuel, rotated a horseshoe here and tugged a trace chain there to maintain operation. I was amazed at his ingenuity.

Before grinding, he took a toll of grain as a charge for the service, then poured the remainder into a bin that fed into the space separating the two millstones. At the end of the sequence, the meal emptied into my meal sack.

When I was too small to load the meal on the horse's back, he assisted me. Later, when I was larger and stronger, he backed away from this chore, recognizing I wanted to demonstrate my maturity and strength.

Most of the black residents were farmers who tended fields that produced large quantities of corn, wheat, oats and hay. Each family also had a garden and grew vegetable for immediate use and for canning.

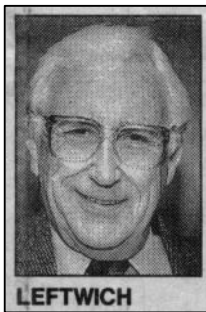
In those days, the black children attended a one-room school about one mile from the one-room Rock Springs school I attended. Though not a firm memory, I believe church services for black worshippers also were held in the school building.

World War II changed life in Rock Springs Valley. Young men left the community to serve in the armed forces or to work in factories. Most never returned to the valley. The era of the sharecropper disappeared. In a new and different way of left elsewhere, education became more important, their children graduated from high school, and many attended and graduated from college.

As far as I know, very few whose roots derived from the Rock Springs community ever earned a Ph.D. One of the two I know was Rochelle Dail, of Lebanon, a great-granddaughter of Wilburn Maddux.

Dr. Dail is an assistant professor at the University of Alabama where she teaches early literacy and elementary reading methods. She currently is administering a program in Bogota, Columbia.

I asked Carolyn (Shanks) Huddleston, whose family lines extend through several generations in Buffalo Valley and Rock Springs adjacent communities, and who is a librarian in Buffalo Valley, to assist with this story. She wrote:



“I know of two families who, just as the Madduxes, were highly respected. They lived on Indian Creek. I remember that Elmo Nichols Maddux would take the children to her house to teach them to read.

“Another family lived further up the creek toward Buckner and we would go there to see the woman’s talking parrot. One time, she came to our house to wash our clothes and I remember her filling the big galvanized tub with water from the well. She told us to ‘get in there with your bare feet and work the clothes up and down.’”

In this century, no black families live in Rock Springs, a footnote to community history largely unrecorded by both black and white early residents who now rest in neglected graves on an obscure hillside.
