MISS ROSEMARY PIEPMEIER BECOMES BRIDE J. T. DEBERRY AT HOME CEREMONY, SATURDAY:

Characterized by charm and individuality was the wedding of Miss Rosemary Piepmeier, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. H. Piepmeier and James Turner DeBerry, son of Major and Mrs. Roy DeBerry of Bloomington Springs, solemnized Saturday afternoon, June 20 at 5:30 o'clock in a beautiful ceremony at the home of the bride's parents on Washington Avenue.

In the taking of the marriage vows, the double ring rites were used, with W. C. Cooke, minister of the Cookeville Church of Christ officiating in the presence of relatives and a limited number of friends.

Preceding the ceremony a program of wedding music was given. Miss Mary Catherine Moore sang, "Believe Me If All Those Enduring Young Charms" and "Sweetheart" with Mrs. W. A. Howard as accompanist, who also played "To A Wild Rose" and other appropriate selections. Miss Geraldine Terry played the wedding march.

The spacious living room was arranged for the nuptial occasion with the altar decorations centralizing around the fireplace. Burning candles in graduated holders placed on the mantel shelf furnished the only lighting for the wedding scene and banking the improvised altar were palms, ferns and other greenery forming a background for the floor baskets filled with graceful arrangements of pink gladioli and feverfew. Rainbow colors predominating in the colors of the bridesmaids' gown and flowers were featured in the further decorations of the reception suite.

Descending the winding stairs the bride and her attendants presented a charming picture as they approached the altar where they were met by the groom and other members of the bridal group.

Mr. Piepmeier gave his daughter in marriage and her youthful beauty was distinguished by her full bridal toilette. Her wedding gown was a combination of plain and embroidered organdy over a satin foundation. The voluminous skirt was of the plain material and was attached to the fitted embroidered bodice with an inserted girdle of the material. The bodice was fashioned with a heart shaped neck line and full flaring sleeves. Her finger tip veil was fastened to her hair with clusters of flowers and in the arrangement of her bouquet which she carried were orchids and a shower of stephanotis. Her only ornament was a string of pearls worn by her mother at the time of her marriage.

Miss Ester Piepmeier attended her sister as maid of honor, wearing a dress of exceptional loveliness, modeled of French blue net. Following the lines of the bride's frock it was styled with a full skirt trimmed with tiny ruffles and the fitted bodice featured long full sleeves and a heart shaped neckline.

Miss Myra Smith, Miss Louise Miller the bride's cousin and Miss Nell DeBerry, the groom's sister, were the bridesmaids wearing pastel shaded dresses made of net and with the exception of short puffed sleeves were fashioned as the maid of honor. Composing the fan shaped bouquets of the four attendants were maline, carnations, larkspur and delphinium and they wore flowers in their hair. Miss Piepmeier's bouquet was of white maline, blue delphinium and yellow carnations tied with yellow satin ribbon.

Miss Smith wore a pink dress and her fan shaped bouquet was a combination of white Moline, purple and pink blossoms and dubonnet ribbon.

Miss Miller and Miss DeBerry's frocks were orchid and green respectively and they carried bouquets of orchid maline with contrasting flowers of purple, pink and yellow.

The bride's niece Carolyn Piepmeier was flower girl and wore a frock of yellow net and her nephew, Edward Piepmeier served as ring bearer carrying the ring on a satin pillow. He wore a white suit. Their parents are Lieut. and Mrs. Francis Piepmeier of St. Louis, MO.

Ensign Millard DeBerry, with the U. S. Navy, served as his brother's best man and the groomsmen were Hargraves Piepmeier, the bride's brother, Malcolm Weathers of Lorette and Memphis and Powell Hutcheson of Springfield. A reception followed the wedding. Standing with their parents and other members of the bridal party, the bride and groom received congratulation in the living room.
