Mott Oversees Station

Had Stacey Mott's vision been keener, he might have found himself zeroing in on Japanese aircraft carriers over the Pacific during World War II.

But when Mott volunteered at the age of seventeen for the U.S. Navy's aviation school, he failed to pass the stiff eyesight test and settled for a hitch in the regular Navy. Having graduated from high school in 1942, Mott had already spent several months as an announcer for WHUB when he reported for duty early in 1943.

After being discharged from the military in 1945, Mott worked part-time at WHUB while attending Tennessee Tech, where he graduated in 1948. After a one-year stint at the University of Kentucky where he studied statistics, Mott rejoined WHUB in the summer of 1949, and, for the past 41 years, that's where he has been.

At first, Mott had general duties before taking over as station manager in late 1954, a position he has held these past 36 years.

"I think I have an ideal job that's always interesting. I think most people would find it enjoyable; much is going on here; we have an excellent group of people who enjoy working together, and clients who are a pleasure to work with," Mott said.
