

Letter to Elizabeth "Besty" Ann Jared
Delina, Tennessee - April 1st 1882
Written by her granddaughter, Ella or Nola Nichols.

My dear Grandma. I was so glad to get your letter that I thought I would write to you imediatley.

Ma is making soap this week. Pa and the boys will plant corn. We have not got any little chickens yet have got 100 eggs sitting ___ more hens nearly every day. We want to rais all of our chickens early so we wont have any lttle ones when we go to come up there.

The school here has commensed, no didn't any of us start I reacon the boys will start after while but sister and I will not go.

Well Grandma I would like to see you and Grandpa you said you waid so much I waid 110 pounds last summer I don't think I would way any more now than I did then.

Myrtle ways almost as much as Mary and is good as she can be.

I am glad that Uncle Pat and Fate have quit logging for it is so dangerous. Tell them that they have worked long enough to rest awhile and for them to come to see us.

Grandma do you really believe that Martha is going to marry? Tell her that I think she had better go to school but if she is going to marry, tell her to not marry until after we come up there for I want to see her once more before during her single life. I think that she is much to young.
