

Another Revolutionary Soldier Has Fallen

'Joseph Jared, s/o John Jared'

Messrs. Editors - As the Congress of the U. States has requested that the death of all the soldiers of the Revolution be published as they occur, I therefore send you an account of the death of Joseph Jared, who served some time, I am not informed how long, in his country's struggle for independence, and the rights of conscience and the privilege of worshipping God according to the dictates of the same, and after he had fought for and obtained them, he lived in the enjoyment of them, and was a great many years a member of the Methodist E. Church.

Father Jared was born in New Jersey, January 2d, 1760, was principally raised in Virginia; emigrated to Tenn. in 1808 and died January 7th, 1848; aged 88 years and 5 days. After he was taken sick he talked but little about death, but from his exemplary walk in life, his friends entertain the strongest hopes that he rests with redeemed ones in that world of bliss, where

There is no sorrow, nor any sighing,
Nor any sin there, nor any dying.

In a few more years all who fought for the liberties we enjoy will sleep in their graves, God grant they all, with father Jared, may be rewarded for their sufferings and labors here, in heaven, where there will be no more warfare. There the wicked ceased to trouble and the weary are at rest.
