There were present 102 people, and 102 people have never spent a happier day. The sons and daughters of Mr. Nichols who were present were Rev. J. H. Nichols, Spring Hill; Rev. B. B. Nichols, Boma; L. B. Nichols, and J. P. Nichols, Baxter; Mrs. G. D. Byrne, Monterey; Mrs. J. A. Boyd, Baxter, and Mrs. L. A. Boyd, Cookeville. One son, J. C. Nichols of Lebanon, who is visiting in Montana, and one daughter, Mrs. T. C. Holladay of Nashville, were not present. Each family was represented by three generations.

A remarkable feature of this family is that there has not been a death among the brothers and sisters in twenty-seven years. The oldest brother, Rev. J. H. Nichols, is 73 years old, and the youngest brother, J. P. Nichols, is 53 years old.

Of the descendants of David Nichols there are now living 9 children, 62 grandchildren, 83 great-grandchildren, and one great-great-grandchild, making a total of 155. Death has removed 39 members of the family, making the total lineage 194.

COOKEVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 9 – (Special) – The annual reunion of the descendants of the late David Nichols was held yesterday at the home of Bethel Boyd, one of his grandsons, near Baxter, this county. More than one hundred descendants and relatives of David Nichols were in attendance and the occasion was a most delightful one for all present. The only thing that marred the pleasure of this annual reunion of the family was the death, a few days ago, of Rev. John H. Nichols, and one of the oldest and best known Southern Methodist ministers in the Tennessee conference. His presence and addresses at the former annual reunions of the family were feelingly referred to.

David Nichols was one of the most prominent and highly esteemed of the pioneer citizens of Putnam county. He died about twenty years ago, at his home in the eleventh civil district of this county, where he and his wife had reared their family of thirteen children – nine sons and four daughters. His wife's maiden name was Elizabeth Jared; one of her sisters was the wife of the late Jefferson Boyd; their only brother was the late Moses A. Jared; their mother was a daughter of William Byrne, one of the foremost pioneer citizens of this section of the state. Thus comes the relation of the Nichols, Jared, Boyd and Byrne families, forming one of the largest family connections in the state. There has also been considerable intermarriage among the members of these families.

David Nichols and his wife were spared to enjoy each other's companionship for more than sixty years and, in ripe old age, they died within a short time of each other, loved and honored by all who knew them. They were devout Methodists and they furnished three sons- Jasper, John H., and B. B. Nichols-to the ministry of the Southern Methodist church.

Of their thirteen children, eight survive them. They are: Rev. B. B. Nichols of Boma, J. P. Nichols of Buffalo Valley, Leroy Nichols of Baxter, J. C. Nichols of Lebanon, Mrs. G. D. Byrne of Monterey, Mrs. James A. Boyd of Baxter, Mrs. T. C. Holladay of Nashville and Mrs. Lafayette Boyd of Cookeville.
