

WILL OF GEORGE HULME JR.

I George Hulme of Middletown tp. In the County of Bucks, & Province of Pensilvania (*sic*), Yeeman being weak in body, but sound in mind and memory, thanks be to God, for the same, and considering the uncertainty of this transitory life, do make and ordain this my last Will and testament, in manner following, committing my body to the earth to be desantly (*sic*) Buried at the discreshan (*sic*) of my Executors, hearafter named, and my soul to God who gave it to me; My will is, that my deabts (*sic*) and funeral expenses be fully paid and discharged and in order theare (*sic*) unto I give and devise and leave all unto my wife, Ruth Hulme, all that my tract of Land and Plantation on which I now dwell, withall the improvements theare (*sic*) unto belonging to hold to her, her heirs and assigns for ever; but that if need be, it may be sold for the payment of my just debts and mentainance (*sic*) of my children.

My will is that my said plantation be sold to the best advantage and after my just debts are paid, I give and bequeath unto my dear wife one third part of what remains, and the other two thirds, I give and bequeath unto my children to be equally divided among them and I also nominate and appoint my brother-in-law, Jonathan Palmer and my dear wife Ruth Hulme to be my Executor and Executrix of this my last Will and testament and set my hand and seal this the ninth day of June 1729.

Signed, sealed, published and declared by the said George Hulme Jr. to be his last will and testament and in possession of us.

On the back of this will it is stated that the will was dictated to the witness by George Hulme, he being in body weak but sound in mind and memory. The will is in the hand writing of Joseph Kirkbride, the first signer.
