Rowan County was formed in 1753 from Anson County, and was named for Matthew Rowan (d. 1760), acting governor at the time the county was formed. The county seat is Salisbury. Initially Rowan included the entire northwestern sector of North Carolina, with no clear western boundary, but its size was reduced as a number of counties were split off. The first big excision was to create Surry County in 1771. Burke and Wilkes Counties were formed from the western parts of Rowan and Surry in 1777 and 1778, respectively, leaving a smaller Rowan County that comprised present-day Rowan, Iredell (formed 1788), Davidson (1822), and Davie (1836). Surry, Burke and Wilkes subsequently fragmented further as well. Depending on where your ancestors lived, you may want to look at records for some of these later counties also. Records of very early land grants in the Rowan County area will be found with Anson County.

FOREWORD: In 1987, *Rhea County, Deed Books, A, B, C, and E* (abstracted by David Gray and Bettye J. Broyles) was published by the Rhea County Historical and Genealogical Society.

Abstracted information from each deed includes location, streams and other landmarks, neighbors, previous owners or grantor (North Carolina or Tennessee), witnesses, date of certification and date registration in Rhea County.

The original Deed Book F was transcribed in 1914 and 1915 by W. A. Howard (Register of Deeds from 1906 through 1914).

- PG. 26 (page 177): **Deed of Conveyance, Moses Paul to Richard Waterhouse**, 120 acres on north side of Piney River at foot of Waldens Ridge for \$500. Dated 15 August 1834. Witnesses: **Jesse Thompson**, James Holloway, and John F. Paul. Deed mentions the "shutin," the Sluice, and an island in Piney. Certified by James Berry, Clerk, on 23rd and 30th August; registered 30 August 1834.
- PG. 27 (page 188 and 189): **Deed of Conveyance, Evan Breeding and Bryant Breeding (of Roane County)**, Baty Breeding, Stephen Breeding, and **Cynthia Paul (nee Breeding; wife of Archibald D. Certified by James Berry, Clerk, 4 September 1835 and by N. G. Frazier, Clerk, 25 June 1836; registered 11 July 1836.
- PG. 42 (page 304 and 305): **Deed of Conveyance, Absalom L. Thompson and Susan Thompson (his wife) to John Smith**, 116 acres on Clear Creek for \$300. Dated 22 September 1836. Witnesses: Abraham Miller and Joseph Killough. Adjoins Jeffrey West on NE, John Smith on SE, John R. Barnett on S, and minor heirs of Isaac West decd on W; mentions the Mill Pond. Certified by N. G. Frazier, Clerk, on 22nd (Susan examined separately); registered 23 September 1836.
- PGS. 57 & 59 (page 424, 425, 426, and 427): Commissioners Report to Elizabeth Smart, Dower in estate of R. G. Waterhouse. Interest to 1 January 1838 amounts to \$11,833.64; the rents, profits, and damages due her from defendants Richard and Blackstone Waterhouse for the detention of her Dower together with interest amounts to \$6,502.44 (total amount, \$18,336.08). Complainants Dower has been laid off and assigned to her. Tract No. 1 contains 714 acres "including the mansion house where Richard G. Waterhouse lived at the time of his death; adjoins 500 acres of Jacob Wassum decd. Tract No. 2 on Piney River contains 700 acres adjoining No. 1. Tract No. 3 contains 1220 acres adjoining Southern Liberties; mentions McClung's line, Wm Johnson's brick house, and Orville Paine's Road. Tract No. 4 contains 778 acres adjoining the Town of Washington; mentions John Locke's line, James Montgomery's line, and Henry Collins Road. Tract No. 5 on waters of Wolf Creek in the Long Hollow, "improved by Spillsbee Dyer." Tract No. 6 contains 50 acres "where Thomas Davis now lives;" mentions Charles Smith's corner. Tract No. 7 on waters of Wolf Creek "including the head of Statons branch where on Miller Lea now lives;" adjoins William Lea. Tract No. 8 contains 50 acres on Big Richland Creek where "Charles Reavly now lives;" mentions John Cozby's line. Tract No. 9 contains 108 acres and includes "the head of the clear fork of Muddy Creek;" adjoins Thomas Thompson, Edward Wasson, and Moses Thompson. Tract No. 10 contains 50 acres on East Fork of Piney adjoining lands of Alexander McCall and A. D. Paul ("where he now lives"). Tract No. 11 contains 60 acres on Vans Creek where A. G. Wright now lives; adjoins John Manefee. Tract No. 12 contains 100 acres adjoining the 166 acres where Thomas Godbehere now lives. Tract No. 13 contains 213 acres and 38 poles on Muddy Creek adjoining James I Cash and John Howell. Tract No. 14 contains 50 acres adjoining the above 213 acres on Muddy Creek; adjoins Charles Mitchell and Isaac Jaquish. Tract No. 15 is Lot No. 31 in Southern Liberties. Tract No. 16 is a lot containing 3 acres "adjoining

Richard Waterhouse's Tan Yard lot now occupied by Andrew Britten and bounded by the road leading from Washington to Kelly's Ferry . . ." Tract No. 17 is waste land "unfit for cultivation;" number of acres unknown. Dated 8 July 1837; signed by **Jesse Thompson**, George Gillespie, John Cozby, Robert Locke, Thos McCallie, and Thos Haws. Court decrees that all title vested in Richard Waterhouse Jr., **Gideon B. Thompson** and Mira (nee Waterhouse) his wife, Euclid Waterhouse, Ann Waterhouse, Vesta Waterhouse, Cyrus Waterhouse, Darius Waterhouse, and Franklin Waterhouse to be vested in complainant Elizabeth. Registered in Rhea County 27 March 1838.

RHEA COUNTY FACTS

Formed by the general assembly on December 3, 1807, Rhea County came out of a portion of Roane County. The new county was situated in a valley between the Tennessee River and the Cumberland Plateau. Though enlarged in 1817, parts of the county were lost in the formation of Hamilton County in 1817 and Meigs County in 1836.


Settlers began moving into this valley bottomland once Cherokees gave up claim to it in 1805. Thomas Moore, Joseph Brooks, and John Henry were the original commissioners appointed to select a suitable place for holding court. They decided upon the

commissioners appointed to select a suitable place for holding court. They decided upon the home of William Henry at Big Spring (north of present-day Dayton); the house served as the county courthouse until October 1812.

In 1809 and in 1811 the general assembly appointed a commission to establish the town of Washington as a county seat. After investigating several sites, Washington (now known as Old Washington) was established in 1812 near the head of Spring Creek on land donated by Judge David Campbell and Richard Green Waterhouse. Lots in the new town were surveyed and sold on May 21 and 22, 1812. Contracts to construct the public buildings were awarded to James C. Mitchell (courthouse), John Moore (jail), and Adam W. Caldwell (stocks and pillory). By 1825 a new jail became a necessity, but it was not completed until 1836. A new brick courthouse, designed by craftsman Thomas Crutchfield, was completed in December 1832.

Newspapers were published in Dayton, Rhea Springs and Spring City. Scattered early issues are available from 1885, and a complete run begins in 1941. See Extended History for More information. **There were fires at the Rhea County courthouse in 1869 and 1927.**

Rhea County is bordered by <u>Cumberland County</u> (north), <u>Roane County</u> (northeast), <u>Meigs County</u> (east), <u>Hamilton County</u> (south) and <u>Bledsoe County</u> (west). DESCRIPTIONS OF CIVIL DISTRICTS District One

Beginning at the north corner of Rhea County running from thence with the Roane County line to Whites Creek and down Whites Creek to the upper corner of Thomas McKiddy's land. Thence with his line to the corner. Thence a direct line to the head of Charles Mitchell's Spring. Thence down his Spring branch to Muddy Creek and down Muddy Creek to Piney River. Thence up Piney River to Johnson's fork of the same and up said Johnson's fork to the Bledsoe County line. Thence with said County line to the Beginning. **We appoint the place of holding elections in the first district at Jesse Thompson's.**

District Two

Beginning at Thomas McKiddy's upper corner on Whites Creek. Thence down said Creek to Tennessee River, thence down said River to the mouth of Piney River, thence up Piney River to the mouth of Muddy Creek. Thence up Muddy Creek to the mouth of Charles Mitchell's Spring Branch. Thence to the head thereof. Thence a direct line to the Beginning. We appoint the place of holding elections in the second district at Archibald D. Paul's.

District Three

Beginning at the mouth of Piney River, thence up Piney River to the bridge on the middle road. Thence with the Middle road to where Horsby's ferry road crosses it. Thence a direct line to the nearest summit of the main leading Wolf Creek ridge. Thence with the extreme Height of said ridge to the nearest summit to Clar Creek. Thence a direct line to the mouth of the Cave Spring branch in West's mill pond on Clear Creek. Thence down Clear Creek with the various meanders thereof to its mouth. Thence up Tennessee River to the Beginning. We appoint the place of holding elections in the third District at John Hill's.

District Four

Beginning at Piney Piney bridge on the Middle road. Thence with the Middle road to where Hornsby's ferry road crosses it. Thence a direct line to the nearest summit of the main leading Wolf Creek ridge. Thence with the extreme height of said ridge to its neares Summit to Clear Creek. Thence a direct line to strike Clear Creek at the mouth of the Cave Spring branch in West's mill pond. Thence up Clear Creek to the head. Thence a direct line to the bridge on Piney River at Beaty's Turnpike road. Thence with said road to David Hoodenplye's on the Bledsoe

County line. Thence with said County line to Johnson's fork of Piney and down Johnson's fork to main Piney River and down Piney River to the Beginning. We appoint the place of holding elections in the fourth district at Spils Be Dyer's.

District Five

Beginning at David Hoodenpyle's on the Bledsoe County line, thence with Beaty's Turnpike road to Piney bridge. Thence a direct line to the head of Clear Creek and down Clear Creek to West's mill. Thence a direct line to the nearest summit of the main Valley ridge. Thence with the extreme height of said ridge to a point bearing S 60 degrees E from Samuel Garwood's, thence a direct line North 60 degrees West intersecting said Garwood's dwelling house, continuing that course to the Bledsoe County line. Thence with said County line to the Beginning. We appoint the place of holding elections in the fifth district at the School house near Jackson Howerton's.

District Six

Beginning at the mouth of Clear Creek and running down Tennessee River to the first large bluff above V. A. Gile's, thence a direct line over the summit of said bluff to Noland's pond near the Washington road. Thence a direct line to the south corner of district No. 5 on the main valley ridge at a point bearing directly S 60 degrees E from Samuel Garwood's dwelling house. Thence with the extreme height of said ridge to the nearest Summit to Clear Creek. Thence directly to West's mill, thence down Clear Creek to the Beginning. We appoint the place of holding elections in the sixth district at the Court House in Washington.

District Seven

Beginning on Tennessee River at the first large bluff above V.A. Gile's, thence a direct line over the summit of said bluff to Noland's pond near the Washington road. Thence a direct line to the corner of districts Nos 4 and 6, thence a direct line N 60 degrees W intersecting Samuel Garwoods's house continuing that course to the Bledsoe County line. Thence with the Bledsoe County line to main Richland Creek. Thence down said Creek to Tennessee River. We appoint the place of holding elections in the seventh district at John Whaley's.

District Eight

Beginning on Tennessee River at the mouth of Richland Creek. Thence up main or Big Richland creek to the Bledsoe County line. Thence with said line to the North corner of Hamilton County. Thence with the Hamilton County line to Tennessee River. Thence up Tennessee River to the Beginning. We appoint the place of holding elections in the eighth district at the house of B. F. Jones.

In pursuance of an entry made by Bryam Breeding of No. 108 dated November 2nd 1829 for one hundred acres of land & by virtue of a deputation to me given by David Shelton, Surveyor for said County, I have Surveyed for the Said Byram Breeding one hundred acres of land on Waldens Ridge of Cumberland Mountain on the waters of Whites Creek on a branch known by Prestons Camp Branch. BEGINNING on a whiteoak & running North eighty five degrees West one hundred and Sixty poles to a Small blackjack tree; then North five degrees East one hundred poles to a blackoak; then South eighty five degrees East one hundred & Sixty poles to a Chestnut, blackgum and hickory; then to the beginning. Surveyed the 2nd day of September 1831.
